The Week in Texas

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ Jesus,

Our beloved synod has just concluded its 64th Convention. Delegates gathered down in Houston, Texas beginning Saturday, July 10, under the theme *One People – Forgiven*. Internet articles informed us of the many daily events: choirs of 300, Texas style bar-b-cue, ice cream socials... There were 603 pastoral delegates, 592 lay delegates, and 371 advisory delegates registered. So barbecues and ice cream socials can play an important part in getting that many Lutherans to smile at each other and work together for a week under the hot Texas sun.

And these delegates did have some difficult issues to deal with during this convention. In our Adult Bible Study we recently reviewed some of the suggestions gathered by the Blue Ribbon Task Force on Synod Structure and Governance. Most of these issues were referred back to the committee once again. Delegates chose to keep having the Convention every three years rather than switch to every four years as recommended in an attempt to save money. A major change was made in that in the future the Synodical president will be elected directly by congregations rather than by delegates to the Convention. They also determined to streamline our Synodical structure by the elimination and consolidation of a plethora of boards under two main boards: Office of National Missions and Office of International Missions. Old commissions will still remain, coordinated under these two.

The delegates did choose a new direction for the Synod electing Reverend Matthew Harrison as our new president. And the delegates once again pondered the usual topics of “recruiting and retaining church workers, affirming that we are indeed against homosexuality as being followed by the ELCA and against abortion.” We will also work with our Lutheran partner church in Germany to form a Luther Museum, Outreach and Visitor Center in Wittenberg.

The theme of this 64th Convention of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod was “One People – Forgiven.” This was the focus for the daily worship and devotions and Bible Studies. Perhaps related to this, one resolution passed was the formation of another task force, this one to promote greater harmony within our synod. Near the end of the sessions, the convention chaplain led delegates in a “Service of Reconciliation,” encouraging all members of synod to set aside their differences, forgive one another, and vigorously share the Word of God and His forgiveness with the world. In other words, the life of the Church is still a challenge, much like it was already in the Book of Acts.

These are appropriate challenges, and they will be difficult ones. Maintaining a synod of over two million souls is not an easy task. But then we remember that Jesus warned it would be difficult. But He also assured that His Church would not fail. And so the delegates have now returned to their 6,000 plus congregations. And we remember that our Synod is built of these congregations = you! You are the Church. And it is right here that the Word of Christ must be shared. We give thanks for a great Synod that helps us maintain the truth and purity of that Word.

Thank you for the monetary gift to get this project done. We are excited for it and very thankful deep down in our heart. We pray that God will recognize the efforts and generosity you show us.

The work of the missionaries is not only for the children, but also makes the adults think of eternal life with God. Even in this way, God keeps His plan going to help all of us survive and look forward to His promise.

May God bless you all, your church, your homes, and your families. Bless your work in God's name.

We pray for you and ask that you continue to pray for us and our church. God's will be done. Remember **1 Peter 5:10-11** And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast. 11To him be the power forever and ever. Amen.

Ukraine Mission Update

It’s hard to believe that our mission to Ukraine has already come and gone for 2010. This brief article is intended to give you an idea of what the Rock of Ages mission team experienced.

The team started the mission in Odessa where we purchased children’s Bibles and stayed at the seminary. Without receiving some of our luggage (especially all five tubs), we proceeded to Kagarlyk. Misha, the elder from the church, greeted us warmly – it was good to see this old friend of the mission. We also met Ura, the youth director who is preparing for seminary in the fall. He and his family are a loving addition for this village church. Our first evening was spent with children performing the lesson and playing games – the crafts would have to wait until the tubs arrived. We attended church service the next day and had a short social time with the fifteen members of this small congregation. Later that evening, we received the tubs and held a VBS session with the children. The next day, Aaron Clymer & Ura held a guitar sing-along for the youth. It was a lot of fun. They would love to have us back again as Misha states in his letter to our congregation. (*The letter is on page 3 of this newsletter*)

Our mission continued to Savran where we have never visited. Pastor Nikoli and family have a very active program in this area. We visited an orphanage, a retirement home and two outlying villages. The children of the orphanage were combined with another orphanage in the summer months so there were about 70 kids to minister to. We would have loved to have more time here so our goal next year will be to see these children more than once. At the retirement home, Pete and Nikoli preached, we sang songs and visited the retirees. We felt their warmth and love in our short time there. Both of the villages had a small church where we held our program of skits, songs, games and crafts. Our time in Savran was great but could have been longer as there is a lot of work to be done there.

Our last stop was in Mykolaiv at our old friends, the Miller family. Our mission work here was an orphanage, two children’s centers for the mentally handicapped, a TB center, the boys home and the men’s center – these last two are familiar destinations as we have been there in past years. Natasha Miller did the research to find the centers most in need and we use this opportunity to get the Word of God into these places. Each day, our visits were short but our program was well received. Culturally, it is difficult to comprehend the isolation society puts upon these people but seeing the warmth in the faces of the children and the men helped us realize that we needed to be there to plant the seed of the Spirit.

Overall, the mission went very well. We are thrilled to have had this opportunity and delighted to share all that we experienced with you. Watch for our presentation sometime in the near future and continue to keep the people of Ukraine in your prayers.
