Coming Home

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ Jesus,

Hittites, Babylonians, Persians, oh my! Then came the Greeks, the Romans, the Ottomans, and more. My mind, if not my eyes, is still spinning from the intensive days of seeing and studying all these ancient cultures. And each in and of itself is fascinating. But even more, is seeing how the God of our Scriptures worked through them all and continues to work until this day.

Each of those civilizations is known today mostly through the stones they've left behind. Some written records exist, but mostly just cold, dead stones, bits of pottery, carved and now broken statues. But we have a living Word, a Word that has come down just as true and living today as it was in the Beginning, while all those civilizations are now dust. The prophet Daniel revealed how this would occur already almost three thousand years ago (Daniel, chapter two).

“In the time of those kings, the God of heaven will set up a kingdom that will never be destroyed” (Daniel 2:44). A kingdom never to be destroyed. That is the kingdom founded by our Lord Jesus Christ. But it was not founded by the power and might of this world, not with swords and armies, but upon a Cross. It is a kingdom that is anchored within the hearts of the faithful.

At times, men have tried to make this kingdom one of power and might upon this earth. In 325, the Roman Emperor Constantine commanded that Christianity would become the religion of the state. But that empire also fell. As Marilyn and I made a big circle through modern Turkey we saw the ruins of each of these empires. Christianity has disappeared from that land. Now the minarets and mosques of Islam dominate.

Islam, too, will fall. That is the promise of Scripture. Only the Cross will stand. And we must keep our focus on the kingdom we have been promised in the Word of Jesus, the kingdom guaranteed by His death and resurrection. It's very easy to become distracted by the physical kingdoms of this world, by the comforts and promises we find here. But again, these will also fall. Jesus promises that He is coming back and that He will then create the new and final kingdom that will endure for all eternity.

It felt great to return home after our tour around Turkey, to familiar home and church and family. But Jesus encourages us to look forward to an even greater homecoming. Looking down at all the ancient stones was interesting, but He encourages us to also be looking up, to be ready for His coming.

In other words she just planted a tiny seed and let it sprout and grow in their hearts.

In another story, a terminally ill woman had a rather unusual request of her pastor. She wanted to be buried with a common table fork in her hand. After a short time the woman died and when people viewed her in the casket, she indeed had a fork in her hand. Many people asked about the meaning of the fork in her hand. The pastor explained, "For all of her life this woman had been told to keep her fork after dinner and with great anticipation she would look forward to what was to come next. She knew that when she was told to keep her fork, the best was yet to come. She wanted to share the message, that the best was yet to come, especially after death when she would be with her Lord!"

So you see, the most effective way to evangelize is not to go door-to-door to tell people about the Lord. It has been proven many times that this is a best a waste of a lot of time and is also very uncomfortable those involved. Each of us has the duty to share our love and faith in Jesus with others and the most effective way is to plant the seeds, pray over them, and let the Holy Spirit sprout them and help them grow.

Together with all of God's Creatures

What would you do if you knew that Jesus would return tomorrow? When Luther was once asked this question, he reportedly answered that he would plant a tree! When I first heard this quote it struck me as a bit odd. After all, what good would a tree be if Jesus were to come back and the world end? Lately I've been thinking a good deal about this as I look around and witness what is happening to God's creation.

Our Synod just published a new document looking at the question of our relationship with God's created world. (If you would like to read it, it is available online as a CTCR document, titled the same as this column.) As this report points out, the issue of the way we humans relate to God's world is increasingly important in today's world. We Christians, who believe God lovingly created the earth and all that is on it, also believe that this same creator commanded his human creatures to tend and care for the earth, its plants, creatures, and other humans. When Adam and Eve first sinned, the earth bore the consequences as well. To this day we can hear the groanings of our world and see the destruction we have brought upon it. But we Christians also have hope. For Jesus came into the world, died for our sins, and rose again thus destroying death. He promises to restore our creation, and in fact has begun this restoration already. We look forward to a new heaven and a new earth, to a time when the groaning will cease.

The question remains- how can we care for God's Earth and God's People in a way that honors the creator? Perhaps more to the point, what steps can we take as the body of Christ here at Rock of Ages Lutheran Church? As I look around, I see some distinct things that our family has already done. For example, the crab-apple trees provide beauty as well as food for our local deer. The majority of our landscaping doesn't require irrigation. We have taken steps to decrease our energy use. Our preschoolers grew vegetables to eat this summer, and provide materials for birds and squirrels to eat and make their nests with.

What more can we do to be faithful stewards in this place? Perhaps we could consider recycling, or growing a garden to benefit our congregation, neighbors, or local food bank. Certainly we can point out God's handiwork when the occasion arises. As we continue the discussion, we look forward to the day that Jesus will return, fully restoring us humans and all of his creation. And perhaps, like Luther, we pass the time by planting trees!
