JOY!

“For the Joy of the Lord is my strength”

Joy to the World! Comfort and Joy. Merry Christmas. We have been singing these carols, hearing these words, and surrounding ourselves with the fervor of Christmas for weeks now. If we believe all that rhetoric, we would think that we are filled with, surrounded by, and experiencing joy constantly! So, is that the case for you?

Truth is, joy can be difficult to “feel.” Especially as the gifts are unwrapped, the feasts eaten, the tree taken down, and the family gone home. It all seems so anticlimactic- this hanging of joy on one day. Perhaps this whole season leaves you feeling less than joyful? With dwindling light, icy winds blowing, and colds going around the winter blues can overwhelm even the most optimistic of us. That doesn’t even take into account the other griefs and sorrows that can sometimes be more keenly felt this time of year.

From the time of Jesus’ birth, through his death and resurrection, joy is being proclaimed as central to the Christian life. For example, in John 15:11 Jesus tells his disciples “I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete.” As he prepares his disciples for his impending death and resurrection, he turns again to joy in Chapter 16. It starts in verse 17, but I will quote starting at 19 “Jesus saw that they wanted to ask him about this, so he said to them, ‘Are you asking one another what I meant when I said, ‘in a little while you will see me no more, and then after a little while you will see me’? I tell you the truth, you will weep and mourn while the world rejoices. You will grieve, but your grief will turn to joy. A woman giving birth to a child has pain because her time has come, but when her baby is born she forgets the anguish because of her joy that a child is born into the world. So with you. Now is your time of grief, but I will see you again and you will rejoice, and no one will take away your joy.’” Jesus points to His resurrection (and eventual return later in the passage) as the source of the joy that the disciples and later we ourselves will experience.

Jesus’ resurrection changes everything. Yes, we mourn and grieve. Jesus did, after all, die on the cross for our sins. But our grief will eventually turn to joy. Even in the midst of our sadness, our holiday let-down, our winter blues, and all of the other physical, spiritual, and mental issues we all grieve, Jesus is there. He offers us himself, and in him we find joy. Perhaps it is fleeting for the moment. But we cling to the promise of the resurrection. Spring will come. Jesus is Alive, and in Him we walk in newness of life.

Library—Monthly Featured Item

Book Review: The 4 book series “Big Thoughts for Little Thinkers” by Joey Allan was recently added to our library. They are targeted at kids ages 4-7, and attempt to tackle theology on a level that kids can understand and engage with.

The characters portrayed in the series are little kids, named things like Gracie and Angel, who explain whichever theological thought is being presented. One downfall is the fact that each book only has one character, so two of the books have a boy and two have a girl. The gender of the story teller impacts the desire of the reader to interact... at least in my house! The artwork and characters (particularly the girls) really appealed to my almost-2 year old. She declared the books hers as I was attempting to read them, so we gave them a whirl.

Overall, the language is a bit preachy- and pretty abstract. In defense of the author, a two-year old is not the target audience! The author also has Reformed Theology, which comes out especially in the title “The Gospel.” It offers several different biblical metaphors for salvation, but emphasizes a need to “ask Jesus into your heart.” Since my audience can’t yet read, it was easy to emphasize a more Lutheran understanding and talk about the Holy Spirit and baptism. On the stronger side, it presented realistic ideas of sin (coloring on the walls and hitting, anyone?) and forgiveness. This was ultimately what stuck and what she talked about after reading the books.

“The Bible” offers lots of information about the Scriptures, their organization, and why they matter. “The Trinity” talks about God’s attributes using words small kids can understand. I wanted it to introduce the big words like omniscient along with it. I guess the reading parent can supply those. “The Mission” talks about sharing your faith and loving your friends. This was my favorite. Overall, I would recommend these books with the understanding that parents can fill in where necessary!
